


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**"Welcome to the Jungle"
-- at Fort Dodge Correctional Facility's 4th annual Puppy Day**

A large crowd came to the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility for its fourth annual Puppy Day held Sunday, August 24. According to Warden Jim McKinney there were 420 guests, and with inmates and staff included there were approximately 550 people in the gymnasium for the program. Two charter bus loads of Lions from Minnesota were among those attending. McKinney and Carol Ann Kirkbride of Ankeny presided. Lions Past Council Chair Kirkbride is Puppy Counselor for the public and prisons of Iowa. The program was planned by the inmates. With the theme of "Welcome to the Jungle" they made it a family affair including participation activities for children, topped off with a "rain forest" that produced a downpour of candy for them.



Approximately 55 puppies - each a potential future Leader Dog - were exhibited, with drill teams of inmate trainers putting on impressive demonstrations of the training that is being accomplished. Two inmates spoke about the positive impact the program has had for them. A growing number of Lions clubs and individuals and other organizations such as churches are sponsoring a puppy; 264 were recognized in the program. Sponsors present were able to meet "their" sponsored puppy and talk with its trainer after the program.

Judy Archer, a Tipton Lions Club member (pictured), recently shared these thoughts about her passion for Lionism:



"Did you ever wonder what Lions Club was all about? Well, I did. I would see people wearing those yellow vests out and about. I asked my husband, Mel, one day after we had been to the Cedar County Fair where we had eaten lunch at the Lions Club food stand. All the workers were wearing their yellow vests. Mel said that

they belong to an international club that does work around the world for people in need. They help kids to see and people that need hearing aids to get them. His concepts of Lions were that they do a lot of good.

Shortly after that conversation the former sheriff of Cedar County, who was also my former boss, asked me if I'd be interested in coming to a Lions Club meeting some evening with him. I came home and told Mel about the invitation. He said to go for it and I just might get my answer about what Lions Club is all about. So I contacted my former boss and accepted his invitation to go to a Lions Club meeting. Was I shocked...there were people that I have known all my life, former classmates, former co-workers, former teachers and former bosses there. I just couldn't wait to get home to tell Mel. I really enjoyed the meeting just by listening to what everyone had to say but I still had not really gotten an answer to my question about what Lions Club is all about.

A couple of months after that meeting, Mel became very ill. He was diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis and was given three months to two years to live. What a shock. I had gone to a few of the Lions meetings but nothing serious as my mind was on doing things with Mel. (Oh, Mel had told me that he wanted me to join the Lions Club as I enjoyed the first meeting so much but I couldn't bring myself to leave him at home to go to a meeting.) Several Lion members called me or stopped by to see how we were doing and I remember thinking, how nice of these members to do this for us.

Well, Mel passed away eight months after he was first diagnosed. I had visits, phone calls, food and flowers come to me from the Lions. At Mel's wake the Lions were there. At his funeral, they were there. You know, it was just like a close-knit family would be. I remember thinking, what a wonderful group of people these Lions are.

As time went by, I did join the Lions Club but I just couldn't bring myself to get really involved. Yet there wasn't a week that went by that one of the members didn't call or stop by to see if I needed anything. I thought they were a very persistent group. Now as I look back over the last six years, I know they were being their normal loving and caring group.

I have gotten very much involved in our Tipton Lions Club and I have not regretted it once. I have been Vice President, President, Zone Chair, Lion Tamer and Assistant Secretary. I have received both the Warren Coleman and Melvin Jones awards. I have had the pleasure of attending the Great Plains

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Lions Leadership Institute. Have I gotten my answer, Mel? Yes, and I am still learning the tremendous and enormous generosity that Lions have. The first thing I have learned is that every Lions member has a big heart. Lions feel a closeness to their community and to people in need around the world. When one Lion member hurts, we all bleed. When there is a disaster anywhere, you can count on the Lions being there. How do you know they are there? Well, just look for them in their yellow vests...



The Vision Impairment Camp was adopted as a project that the Foundation and the Trustees have supported since it was created, to give blind individuals the chance to have fun and learn skills they might not have known they had.

**Lions' Visual Impairment Week:
Camp Courageous July 6-11, 2014**

As one of the trustees charged with raising funds for this week of camp, I thought that it would be beneficial to me personally and to the Lions of Iowa that I participate in this week of camp. I volunteered as a counselor for the week. It's hard to describe how rewarding my week was and how I wish to express my thanks as well as the thanks of the Iowa Lions Foundation to the Lions of Iowa that made this week possible. 

Box 418, Monticello, Iowa 52310 identified for Lions Visual Impairment and Disabilities Camp. **You can also donate your time.** Just think how great you can feel by committing your time to at least one day during the week. You'll go away with a great reward in your heart. Remember Lions: WE SERVE!

You can only imagine what this means to a visually impaired camper. During the week, they will have the opportunity to go swimming, horseback riding, bike riding via a specialized bike, canoeing, camping, going down the zip line, and many other activities. Also, a ride on the scale model train, housed at the Iowa Lions Railroad Depot, is a real favorite activity for the campers to participate in. Everyone should see the smiles on their faces as they are having so much fun throughout their week-long camping experience.

There is a tremendous amount of work that goes on prior to the start of the week. Prior to the week, the campers for the week are known, and decisions made as to what "cabins" and staffing will be required to meet the needs of the campers.

For the campers the week starts out with their arrival and greeting by their counselors. The family or persons bringing the camper checks them in and signs the necessary paperwork. Their medications are checked in with the nursing staff and the campers are given a brief physical exam to document their status upon arrival. Then it's off to the cabins for putting their belongings away. Each camper gets a marked location to place their belongings in locations selected by their counselors prior to their arrival. Personal bathroom items are kept separately in a secure closet. Medications are distributed by the nursing staff per the instructions at check-in. Food restrictions if any for the campers are monitored by dietary staff. Any special needs are noted, food prepared and marked for distribution at each meal.

Once campers are settled in there is an evening meal with introductions of the camping groups to get everyone involved

and then the scheduling of activities takes place. They are done by the counselors of each group but trying to maximize the enjoyment of each camper. After this there was karaoke out on the sidewalk and lawn until bedtime at 8:30 p.m. Evening meds are distributed and campers are readied for bed. Campers are never left alone at night; there are three counselors there at all time to assist the campers through the night. Some campers have to have their positions changed several times during the night or helped to the bathroom, etc. Counselors take turn during the week to ease the strain on all. The counselors are compassionate and kind, ensuring that their campers are safe, engaged, and enjoying their daily activities.

The people who participated during the week of Lions Visual Impairment Camp range from young to old. All are visually impaired but can have other major problem(s) that complicate their lives. There were 51 campers that attended this year's camp, 41 males and 10 females. The number was up by two over last year. Some of the people work, but because of their visual impairment have to work several different jobs and this week is their opportunity to participate in activities that are not possible in their normal lives.

Visual Impairment (VI) week does not fill up as fast as other weeks at Camp Courageous, but there continues a great demand. Over the years the VI campers' demographics have changed. They are not just necessarily visually impaired, but

some have more disabilities. This change is probably due to the constantly growing work Iowa Lions do in our continuous battle of being "Knights of the Blind" through our programs in the vision screening of the children of Iowa. The Lions of Iowa have championed this in the program now known as **Iowa KidSight**. Iowa Lions are detecting problems early on and have probably reduced the number of visually impaired children. Our impact has been felt which leads to our serving a more challenged population of the visually impaired.

We as Lions have taken on challenges and have made progress but progress has consequences, it changes our perception of whom we serve and expands it.





Youth Camp

In 2011, work was started to update the policy manual of the Iowa Lions International Youth Camp, Inc. That work was never completed. The corporation was originally formed in 1983, with the Articles of Incorporation being restated in 1989. The original Articles stated that the camp was under the jurisdiction of Lions Clubs International, and the Articles were restated at their request to change that item. The organization is a fully owned subsidiary of Iowa Lions, and under the guidance of the Council of Governors.

It came to my attention that the election of officers for that organization was to have been held at the first Council Meeting, which was held in August. That did not happen. At that time we were to have elected the corporation's president, secretary, and treasurer. Other directors are officially appointed by the president of the corporation, according to the bylaws.

While researching this matter, we discovered that the

work being conducted in 2011 was being authored by PDG Sheri Holliday. It's obvious that a lot of work went into that, but it was never fully adopted by the Council of Governors, who control the Camp.

In order to finish this work, an Ad Hoc Committee was appointed to determine the appropriate next steps. The Committee made a recommendation to the Council that PDG Sheri Holliday be appointed to serve as interim president of the Iowa Lions International Youth Camp, Inc., and that the work be finalized that was started in 2011. PDG Sheri has graciously accepted this appointment and challenge.

Applications for the ongoing role of president, secretary and treasurer of the Iowa Lions International Youth Camp will be accepted through November 1. The next Council Meeting is scheduled for November 14 and 15 at the Sleep Inn in Pleasant Hill at which time the election will be held.

Centennial

As you know, 2017 will be our Centennial Celebration of Lions Clubs International, to be held in Chicago, at the International Convention. Each District has been requested to appoint a District Centennial Chair, who can work with a statewide committee toward enhanced communication about the events that will be happening, and hopefully increase attendance at that convention. The Council of Governors has determined that we need to have a State Centennial Convention Chair to assist each District with these efforts. The election of that Chairperson will also be held at the Council Meeting on Nov. 14 and 15, and anyone interested in serving in that capacity should make their wishes known to their District Governor by November 1.

Leader Dogs for the Blind 75th year anniversary Kennel Project underway

Leader Dogs for the Blind is celebrating 75 years of service this year. In celebration of the 75th anniversary and in support of their Kennel Redesign Project, Leader Dogs for the Blind is undertaking an historic campaign to further their mission, their capacity to develop quality Leader Dogs, and their ability to serve their clients. The last kennel renovation was done in the 1980s. The highlights of the kennel redesign are: renovated training & kennel area, expanded puppy area, enhanced welcome lobby, modern, centralized vet clinic, a new "intake" area, and a new breeding area. The impact of the redesign will be: to develop the best Leader Dogs for the clients, to increase the capacities of their educational programs, to create an environment to positively impact graduation rates, to create a space specifically designed to develop the dogs their clients need, and to offer an environment that is best suited to successful, happy dogs.



This Kennel Project Capital Campaign is patterned after Campaign SightFirst and Campaign SightFirst II that Lions Clubs International Foundation had several years ago. Leader Dogs for the Blind is asking for club donation **PLEDGES** and for personal **PLEDGES** by individual Lions if they so desire for **A THREE YEAR COMMITMENT time period**. Pledges of \$5,000 or more may be fulfilled over a **FIVE YEAR** period. Pledge of \$4,999 and below must be fulfilled over a **THREE YEAR** period. If a club/individual wants to donate the entire commitment in the first year, that is fine too.

PLEASE NOTE: These pledges are in addition to your "normal" annual donation to Leader Dogs for the Blind's routine day-to-day business operating expense. Please note that "regular" annual donation checks will still be made payable to "Leader Dogs for the Blind."

BUT this special **anniversary commitment pledge check MUST BE MADE PAYABLE TO "LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND - KENNEL PROJECT."** We encourage clubs to have a "special" project fundraiser to raise funds for the Kennel Project.

Your District Leader Dog Chairperson will be bringing information to each club in your district this year. Please welcome them to visit your club as soon as possible. They each have the past five year history of donations your club has made to Leader Dogs for the Blind.

There are different types of recognition for donations:
"75th Anniversary Society" - which allows **CLUBS** of **ALL** sizes to be recognized equally. Bronze level is \$75 per member donation; Crystal level is \$150 per member; Silver level is \$250 per member; Gold level is \$500 per member; Diamond level is \$750 per member donation. Any club that donates \$7,500 or more total amount over a **THREE YEAR PERIOD** will be recognized on the Leader Club Recognition Wall in the new Leader Dogs for the Blind facility.

"1939 Community" recognition is for **INDIVIDUAL Lions**: Trailblazer is \$750 individual donation; Innovator is \$1,500 donation; Pioneer is \$2,500 donation; Visionary is \$5,000 donation.

Leader Dogs for the Blind is asking every club to make this campaign a top priority for this 2014-15 Lion year. There will be displays and presentations at every district convention/rally. Remember, our collective efforts will impact the future of the Leader Dog organization for many years to come ... and most importantly, the blind clients that Leader Dogs serve!

This pledge campaign only lasts until June 30, 2015. The pledge period is for three years to fulfill the pledge, but the **pledges must be made this Lions' year.** **ALL PLEDGE DONATIONS MUST BE SUBMITTED WITH THE SPECIAL DONATION FORM FOR THE KENNEL PROJECT.** Your District Leader Dog Chair has those forms available.

Clubs will send their campaign gifts directly to Leader Dogs for the Blind, using the special pledge forms. Leader Dog will process gift information, acknowledge gifts, and provide the donor recognitions. **MAKE SURE YOUR CLUB USES THE CORRECT SPECIAL DONATION FORMS TO SUBMIT YOUR DONATIONS.**

Donations can be kept anonymous, if so desired: that just needs to be checked at the bottom of the Pledge Form when the funds are remitted. EVERY DONATION WILL RECEIVE A PERSONAL THANK YOU FROM LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND. Don't underestimate your club. Our Iowa clubs are very proud of the fact that we have the best Leader Dog Puppy Raising program in North America. This Kennel Project Campaign gives our Iowa Lions the opportunity to also show North American Lions that we are committed to the best Leader Dog KENNEL facility and school in the world. Remember you have a multi-year period to fulfill your pledge.

Every club in Iowa could easily realistically donate \$75/member over a three year period. For example: \$75 x 20 members = \$1,500 divided by 3 years = \$500 per year. A Message about the Leader Dogs for the Blind campaign for the Canine Development Center from Bill Hansen, PID

Dear Fellow Lions,

Seventy-five years ago, Leader Dog was founded by three Detroit-area Lions club members. Working together, the Lions family and Leader Dog team have changed the lives of more than 14,500 blind or visually impaired clients worldwide.

The process starts in the Leader Dog kennel in Rochester Hills, Michigan. It is here that the Leader Dog team breeds future Leader Dogs, cares for young puppies and prepares the dogs for lifelong partnerships with people who are blind. Lions are an integral and invaluable part serving as breeding host families, puppy raisers, donors and advocates for the program.

The kennels are a key component to the Leader Dog program. The newest facility, built in 1992 (and the oldest in 1968) no longer meets today's needs. The last 20 years have witnessed dramatic changes in breeding techniques, the type of dog needed for clients, the kenneling environment and training techniques. Leader Dogs for the Blind has created a redesign of the kennel into a Canine Development Center--a critical component to meet current and future mission needs.

Just as Lions did 75 years ago, once again we will play a key role. Leader Dog needs our support to fund this project. Success depends on our committed leadership and involvement, and yet, we must continue to promote Leader Dog's mission and strengthen our community-based outreach and referral efforts.

Through our participation as Lions in Leader Dog's campaign, we have the power to continue to make a difference as we have for 75 years. It all begins with you.





SERVICE

What is it? Service takes on many definitions, but one of the many definitions Webster provides is “work done or duty performed for others.” That defines what Lions do. Our Motto is very simple. We Serve! It does not say what form of service we provide. Community Needs Assessment by a Lions club in a community will determine what the service needs are in a community. Things such as providing glasses and hearing aids to individuals who can’t afford them; provide free eyesight screening to children before they enter school. Maybe it is as simple as reading to children. Provide programs for adults who cannot read above the second or third grade. Recently a presentation stated that 44 percent of the population cannot read above the elementary grades. This individual could not read above the third grade but had a degree from college. Can your Lions Club form a service project in your club to help these adults with their reading skills? Do you have any retired educators who might make good Lions and manage this program?

Speaking of service: Liz and I had the opportunity to attend the puppy dog program at the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility. This is a win-win program for Leader Dog, the Lions and the inmates of the facility. This program not only develops future Leader Dogs for the sight impaired but provides a great rehabilitation tool for the correctional facility and gives the inmates the opportunity to give back to the world. If your club has not adopted a puppy, I strongly encourage the club to do so. For a 500 dollar donation the club can name the dog and receive updates from the handler of the pup. A vital service you can provide to Leader Dog and the inmate in the correctional facility. See your Leader Dog chairman for the details of this program.

When the word service comes up, we often think of the military service. Veterans have made many contributions and sacrificed much to serve our country. As members leave the military and come home, provide them an opportunity to get involved in the community as Lions. Lions Clubs International waves the entrance fee for veterans and those currently serving in the National Guard and Reserves. Honor all veterans in your community – both members in your club and those who are not.

Service takes on many forms: raising money for the Iowa Lions Foundation and Lions Clubs International

Foundation so Lions can help on projects on a larger scale than an individual clubs can handle. Provide measles vaccine to millions of children around the world who may be blinded or become hearing impaired or even die from the disease. Eradicate River Blindness in areas of the world where it is prevalent.

I would like to thank the Le Claire Lions Club for their hospitality extended to Liz and me. In addition to formally installing this year’s officers, the club presented a Melvin Jones and Warren Coleman awards. Also thanks to the Past District Governors for allowing a non-PDG to talk to the group. They continue to serve the district and are always looking for ways to contribute to the district, their clubs and communities.




